# Scripture Reading Plan

- ► This week's Bible reading covers the start of Paul and Barnabas's missionary journey, where they preached the gospel to Gentiles across Cyprus and Galatia, facing persecution and performing miracles. Despite hardships, including Paul being nearly stoned to death, they stayed committed to their mission. Later, Paul expanded his ministry into Macedonia and Greece—visiting cities like Philippi, Thessalonica, Athens, and Corinth. There, he boldly shared the gospel amid cultural and philosophical challenges, using miracles, preaching, and thoughtful dialogue to connect the message of Christ to diverse audiences, demonstrating the Holy Spirit's guidance and God's power.

Suddenly there was such a violent earthquake that the foundations of the prison were shaken. At once all the prison doors flew open, and everyone's chains came loose. [ Acts 16:26 ]

# Sermon Outline Big Idea

▶ A liberating church confronts injustice, worships through suffering, embraces the outsider—even the oppressor—and boldly stands for truth, because the gospel doesn't just set people free—it shakes the foundations of oppression.

#### Introduction

- ▶ Real liberation doesn't always start with freedom.
- Sometimes, chains fall off last.
- ► What does it look like to be spiritually free even while physically bound?

#### Scene 1: Confronting Injustice (vv. 16–21)

- ▶ Paul frees a girl spiritually—and economically.
- ▶ Gospel justice disrupts systems of exploitation.
- ► Reflection: Where are we called to speak Jesus' name into injustice?

#### Scene 2: Worshiping Through Suffering (vv. 22–25)

- ▶ Paul and Silas sing in prison—before they're free.
- ▶ Worship is a declaration of who God is, not how life feels.
- ▶ Habakkuk 3:17–18 "Yet I will rejoice…"
- ▶ Question: What does midnight worship look like in your life?

# Scene 3: Embracing the Outsider (Even the Oppressor) (vv. 26–34)

- ▶ Paul and Silas stay—for the sake of their jailer.
- ► Grace doesn't just free the oppressed—it reaches the oppressor too.
- ► Application: Who needs grace from you—even if they don't "deserve" it?

#### Scene 4: Standing Boldly for Truth (vv. 35-40)

- ▶ Paul demands public acknowledgment—not revenge.
- ▶ Truth and love are not opposites—they travel together.
- ► Takeaway: Grace doesn't mean silence. It means speaking truth rooted in love.

# **Small Group Discussions**

- 1. Where do you see injustice around you right now—at school, work, in your city, or online? How might Jesus be inviting you to "name it" and respond with both truth and love?
- 2. Paul and Silas worshiped before they were set free.

Can you think of a time when worship felt hard—but you did it anyway? What happened?

3. The gospel freed a slave girl and embraced a Roman jailer.

Why is it so difficult to extend grace to people who have hurt us? What does that reveal about our understanding of God's grace?

4. Paul didn't stay silent about injustice—but he also didn't seek revenge.

What does it look like to stand up for what's right without becoming bitter or combative?

- **5.** "The other prisoners were listening."
  Who in your life is "listening" to how you live out your faith—especially during tough seasons? What kind of witness are they seeing?
- 6. This passage ends with a public challenge to systems of oppression.

What would it look like for our small group (or church) to become a liberating community in our city?
